


A YEAR IN PICTURES


Thurstonland First School. We aim to cover our route so that we finish at the Rose & Crown around 8pm, which allows families to join us before the children have to go to bed!

Then and Now

Several villagers will have a copy of this old Edwardian postcard – I think 'Towngate' seems a better name for the main road than 'The Village'! The word 'Gate' is derived from the old Norse 'gat' which originally meant a road or path rather than a barrier which closed it. '1839' refers to the number of the postcard, not the date. Like many pieces of iron, the railings in front of the shop probably disappeared when needed for the war effort. If you

Since these postcards were sent in around 1910, little has changed to the buildings looking up The Village. There were no parking problems then, and the photographer has obviously drawn a crowd! Postcards were very popular in Edwardian times, no doubt helped by the price of posting – just ½d, half that of a letter.

Thurstonland Cricket Club News

'Raindrops keep falling on my head' would have been an appropriate refrain for the 2023 season. The cool and damp months of April and May were followed by June weather which seemed a reprise of the warm settled condition of 2022 but that proved to be a false dawn. Starting on the second Saturday in July and continuing until the end of August seven out of the eight match days saw play interrupted, the start delayed or a total washout.

The irony was that the final games on September 9th were played in record temperatures for the time of year with welcome pauses for drinks the order of the day.

For a second season the club enjoyed the company of Jimmy Kain who journeyed from his home in Adelaide. He topped the batting averages and just fell five runs short of scoring 1,000 over his two years with us. His leg spin bowling did not quite claim as many victims as in 2022 but his fielding was as dynamic as ever. Our junior players also appreciated his encouragement when helping with coaching.

The first team finished in eighth place out of twelve in the third section of the Huddersfield League with victories in the final two games banishing any lingering fears of relegation. Whilst most batters produced one or two good innings they rarely seemed to come off in the same matches which left the bowlers trying to defend slightly less challenging scores.

The second team was once again made up of experience and youth and, although more wins might have been desirable, encouraging participation is a key element at that level.

Once more the club was indebted to everyone who helped in any capacity with our junior teams with the Under 17s and Under 13s finishing high in their league sections but the emphasis remains on enjoyment whatever an individual's playing abilities.

Mention must also be made of the thriving female section, the Thurstonland Thundercats. Junior and senior players can opt for softball or hardball cricket and coaching sessions are well attended with games arranged against other teams in the local area.

Next year sees the club celebrate its 150th anniversary when one or two special events will be organised along with the publication of an updated history of the club.
