## A PASTORAL MESSAGE FOR THE NEW YEAR FROM REV NICK HEATION VICAR OF ST DAVID'S CHURCH HOLMBRIDGE

#### **NEW YEAR 2025**

So, we have come to the end of another year. The media has been filled with commentaries on the year that will soon be consigned to history, and speculative predictions on what lies ahead.

For me new year is always a reflective time; a time for taking stock of what I am doing with my life, with the time that God has given me.

Human beings have always marked time by significant events. The real question is not whether we will mark time, but how we will do so. What events and what messages are we proclaiming in the calendaring of time?

For the Christian, time is not meant to become a tyrant ruling over us. Rather, it's intended to be a teacher, instructing and presenting us with opportunity and invitations to walk the way of Jesus.

Rather than being dreaded as an enemy, it's to be cultivated as a friend. Its role and reach is a part of the redemptive loving plan of God. In the Incarnation, the Eternal Word became flesh; breaking into time to transform it from within.

The Lord who created time, now gives us time as a gift.

By entering into time He removed the curse it held over all men and women by defeating death.

In Him, time now becomes a field of choice where we can grow as Jesus' followers, experience fully human life and find real freedom. We can begin to participate in God's loving plan to recreate the entire cosmos in and through Jesus Christ.

Time is the road along which this loving plan of redemption proceeds in our individual lives and in the history of this world. We are invited to participate in this loving plan by living our lives close to God, following the way of Jesus in the church and on our frontlines day by day.

So, how do we view time?

Is it a tyrant ruling over us? Or, is it a tutor, teaching us the way to live our lives in this world so that they open into eternity?

Christians proclaim a linear timeline in history. There is a beginning and an end, a fulfilment, which is a new beginning. Time is actually heading somewhere. That is as true of the history of the world as it is our own personal histories.

Do we live this way?

Christians mark time by the great events of the Life, Death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. We are moving toward His loving return. As John recorded in the last book of the Bible; Revelation, our use of time is meant to bear good fruit. We will bear good fruit .....if we have an intimate relationship with the One who both gives and governs time.

So, time is the opportunity for the Christian to bear fruit that lasts. So how will we, how will you use the time God is giving you in the year ahead?

How will you deepen and sustain your relationship with him? How can enjoy closer fellowship with our church family? How can you bear good fruit for him in your daily life?

Will I find a way (or ways) of finding regular time for God in my life? Will I make myself open to Him teaching me new things? Dare I see time, even daily, ordinary work and family life as an opportunity to serve Him and be a part of his ongoing healing work in the world?

## **Thurstonland Community Choir News**

The Choir had a slightly stumbling start to its Christmas activities with the cancellation of our performance at the New Mill Christmas Market. Given that our members are of various ages and locations, and given the amount of snow that had fallen overnight, it was deemed too unsafe to ask people to travel.

That cancellation meant that we hadn't been able to perform the song that we'd used as the theme for our Christmas tree in church, a jazzy version of Frank Sinatra's "Let it snow, let it snow!". We therefore decided that we'd sing it at then end of the Carol service in church, which went down well with the congregation! Indeed the whole Carol service was lovely with a beautiful solo verse to start "Once in royal David's city" sung by Dawn Leeming. We also included a couple of rather lovely carols for ladies in 3 parts, the Ukrainian "Carol of the bells" and Benjamin Britten's "Balulalow" from his Ceremony of Carols.

Our final engagement was leading the Carol singing around Thurstonland with our friends HD9 Community Brass. As most of you will know we were looking to collect donations in aid of the Forget Ne Not Children's Hospice and engaged some of our younger villagers to help collect donations from village houses. I'm sure you'll agree that our collectors:- Fabien and Pablo Selka, Guy and Annabel Bailey, and Hettie Langrick were extremely diligent but courteous in their collecting. We had a good number of villagers come on the walk and everyone seemed appreciative of the warm mince pies brought out to the green and provided by the generous Choir members.

We are especially grateful and proud of the efforts of our village to support this excellent cause and we can now report that on the night our final total of donations was a magnificent £521.30. Thank you all so much!
